Introduction

In order to inform the decision making process about public toilet closures, a customer survey was launched on 13 April 2015 for a period of six weeks.

The survey was hosted on the Council's Consultation Hub and asked members of the public, community organisations and businesses to provide their feedback on the proposed closure of the following toilets:

- Ardmillan
- Canaan Lane
- Canonmills
- Currie
- Granton Square
- Hawes Pier, South Queensferry
- Joppa
- Juniper Green
- London Road
- Middle Meadow Walk
- St. John's Road
- Tollcross

These toilets were selected for proposed closure using the following criteria:

- Condition of the building
- Accessibility
- Usage
- Proximity to other Council and publicly accessible toilets
- Potential for Community Toilet Scheme within the local area
- Possible Lothian Buses support/ interest

Participants in the survey were provided with a map showing the location of the proposed closures, along with information about where alternative toilet facilities were available in Council buildings across the city. The following questions were asked about the closures:

• Do you think the closure of toilets would affect you or others in your community? (Please describe the effect you think this particular closure would have.)



- Would the closure of this toilet be detrimental to your quality of life, and ability to participate in local events/ activities? (Please describe how this closure would impact on your quality of life.)
- If you are providing comments on behalf of a group, please provide comments on how these closures would impact on your local area.

In order to explore potential alternative means of maintaining public toilets, the following questions were posed to community groups and businesses:

- If you are commenting on behalf of a group and would like to discuss taking on a degree of management of your local public toilet, please provide your contact details below.
- Businesses that take part in the (Community Toilet) Scheme would allow members of the public to use their toilet facilities without making a purchase. The Council would provide a payment to each business that participates in exchange for providing this facility, and would feature your business on the Council's website. If you are providing comments on behalf of a business and would be interested in finding out more about participating in a Community Toilet Scheme, please provide your contact details below.

Response Rates

There were 1,969 responses to the survey in total.

Of these, 1,911 answered the question as to whether they were responding as an individual or as part of a group. 1,848 (96.7%) were individual respondents and 63 (3.3%) were responding on behalf of a group.

Response Themes

Responses to Question One for each of the sites surveyed covered a range of themes. Some of these were generic to all the public toilets surveyed, but some were specific to that particular site.

Generic themes that were produced consistently across all sites for this question were as follows:

- That there are no other toilets in the local area
- That closures will have an impact on specific user groups such as older people, disabled people, parents and carers with young children, and bus and taxi drivers
- Closures will cause an increase in public urination
- Closures would have an impact on the lives of people with certain medical conditions, that mean they need to have ease of access to toilet facilities
- That public toilets are a necessary public service
- Closures would have an impact on local businesses.

Responses to Question Two also produced a similar range of themes, with some specific issues that were applicable to certain sites.

Generic themes that were produced consistently across all sites for this question were as follows:

- That the respondent's quality of life would be negatively affected by the closure of public toilets
- That closures will have an impact on specific user groups such as older people, disabled people, parents and carers with young children, and bus and taxi drivers
- That a lack of public toilets would restrict the respondent's participation in social and leisure activities
- That respondents would be less likely to visit a particular area without public toilets (which could have an impact on local businesses)
- That closures would have an impact on the lives of people with certain medical conditions, that mean they need to have ease of access to toilet facilities

Responses to Question Three produced a similar range of themes to the first two questions. There were additional comments specific to a particular area, but the following feedback was also provided:

- That toilet closures would have an impact on tourists
- That toilet closures would have an impact on specific community groups
- That the proposal to close public toilets is uncivilised
- That toilet closures will have an Equalities impact.

The overall number of responses received per site will be described in the next section of this report, and will include specific issues highlighted in certain areas. Examples of comments received for each site are provided in the <u>Appendices</u> of this report.

Ardmillan

Question One: Do you think the closure of this toilet will affect you or others in your local community?

83 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 79 (95.18%)

No: 4 (4.82%)

68 comments were received that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on them or others in their community. The range of themes that were covered in these responses and examples of responses are detailed in <u>Appendix One</u> of this report.

In addition to the generic themes described above, the following feedback was received that is particular to this public toilet:

• Closure of toilets would have an impact on football match days, when there are many more visitors to the area

Question Two: Would the closure of this toilet be detrimental to your quality of life, and ability to participate in local events/ activities?

81 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 68 (83.95%)

No: 13 (16.05%)

55 comments were received that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on their quality of life and ability to participate in local events and activities. A summary of the themes covered by these responses and examples of comments received are detailed as <u>Appendix One</u> of this report.

Question Three: If you are providing comments on behalf of a group, please provide comments on how these closures would impact on your local area

Ten responses were received to this question, which mentioned the importance of a Community Toilet Scheme in the event of closures, and the potential equalities impact that closures would have. Examples of comments received to this question are detailed in <u>Appendix One</u> of this report.

Canaan Lane

Question One: Do you think the closure of this toilet will affect you or others in your local community?

141 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 134 (95.04%)

No: 7 (4.96%)

127 comments were received, that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on them or others in their community. The range of themes that were covered in these responses and examples of responses are detailed in <u>Appendix Two</u> of this report.

In addition to the generic themes described above, the following feedback was received that is particular to this public toilet:

- Willing to pay charge for use of public toilets
- The toilet is located in a very busy shopping area
- Closure would have no impact
- The toilet is in close proximity to two hospitals
- The toilets is in close proximity to a play park
- Decrease in antisocial behaviour
- Suggestion for alternative use of the site
- Closure will result in an increased use of Morningside Library
- Closure would cause an increase in antisocial behaviour

Question Two: Would the closure of this toilet be detrimental to your quality of life, and ability to participate in local events/ activities?

138 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 113 (81.88%)

No: 25 (18.12%)

102 comments were received, that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on their quality of life and ability to participate in local events and activities. In addition to the generic themes described above, the following feedback was received that is particular to this public toilet:

- Closure would encourage people to walk less
- Respondents do not want to visit private establishments
- Closure would have a negative impact on patients and visitors from the two nearby hospitals
- Closure would have a negative impact on Morningside Library

A summary of the themes covered by these responses and examples of comments received are detailed as <u>Appendix Two</u> of this report.

Question Three: If you are providing comments on behalf of a group, please provide comments on how these closures would impact on your local area

Six responses were received to this question. As well as the generic themes detailed above, these responses focused on the impact closures would have on older people's services, the proximity to two hospitals and the impact on the well-being of local people. A summary of these comments is detailed in <u>Appendix Two</u> of this report.

Canonmills

Question One: Do you think the closure of this toilet will affect you or others in your local community?

117 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 115 (98.29%)

No: 2 (1.71%)

102 comments were received that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on them or others in their community. The range of themes that were covered in these responses and examples of responses are detailed in <u>Appendix Three</u> of this report.

In addition to the generic themes described above, the following feedback was received that is particular to this public toilet:

- Closure would have an impact on people using the Water of Leith
- These toilets are well maintained
- Respondents do not want to use private establishments

Question Two: Would the closure of this toilet be detrimental to your quality of life, and ability to participate in local events/ activities?

116 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 105 (90.52%)

No: 11 (9.48%)

88 comments were received that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on their quality of life and ability to participate in local events and activities. A summary of the themes covered by these responses and examples of comments received are detailed as <u>Appendix Three</u> of this report.

Question Three: If you are providing comments on behalf of a group, please provide comments on how these closures would impact on your local area

Two responses were received to this question, that highlighted the impact the closure would have on bus drivers and also that it would be preferable to retain an example of the historic pairing of a public toilet and Police Box. These are included in <u>Appendix Three</u> of this report.

Currie

Question One: Do you think the closure of this toilet will affect you or others in your local community?

42 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 38 (90.48%)

No: 4 (9.52%)

35 comments were received that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on them or others in their community. The range of themes that were covered in these responses and examples of responses are detailed in <u>Appendix Four</u> of this report.

In addition to the generic themes described above, the following feedback was received that is particular to this public toilet:

- The toilets are located near a popular walking area
- Closing both Currie and Juniper Green would have a negative impact on the local area
- Suggestions for alternatives to closures (such as contribution from Lothian Buses)
- Closure would have no impact on the local area

Question Two: Would the closure of this toilet be detrimental to your quality of life, and ability to participate in local events/ activities?

41 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 33 (80.49%)

No: 8 (19.51%)

28 comments were received that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on their quality of life and ability to participate in local events and activities. A summary of the themes covered by these responses and examples of comments received are detailed as <u>Appendix Four</u> of this report.

Question Three: If you are providing comments on behalf of a group, please provide comments on how these closures would impact on your local area

One response was received to this question, which raised concerns about the impact this closure would have on community/ health workers in the area. This comment can be seen in <u>Appendix Four</u> of this report.

Granton Square

Question One: Do you think the closure of this toilet will affect you or others in your local community?

74 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 70 (94.59%)

No: 4 (5.41%)

58 comments were received that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on them or others in their community. The range of themes that were covered in these responses and examples of responses are detailed in <u>Appendix Five</u> of this report.

In addition to the generic themes described above, the following feedback was received that is particular to this public toilet:

- Some alternative facilities are available nearby
- Some community and health workers rely on this public toilet

Question Two: Would the closure of this toilet be detrimental to your quality of life, and ability to participate in local events/ activities?

74 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 61 (82.43%) No: 13 (17.57%)

49 comments were received that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on their quality of life and ability to participate in local events and activities. It was felt that the closure of these toilets would discourage visitors from the improved Waterfront area and have an impact on the appearance of the surrounding area. A summary of the themes covered by these responses and examples of comments received are detailed as <u>Appendix Five</u> of this report.

Question Three: If you are providing comments on behalf of a group, please provide comments on how these closures would impact on your local area

Five responses were received to this question. Concerns were raised about the impact these closures would have on community and health workers in the area. Examples of comments received to this question are included in <u>Appendix Five</u> of this report.

Hawes Pier, South Queensferry

Question One: Do you think the closure of this toilet will affect you or others in your local community?

383 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 373 (97.39)

No: 10 (2.61%)

335 comments were received that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on them or others in their community. The range of themes that were covered in these responses and examples of responses are detailed in <u>Appendix Six</u> of this report.

In addition to the generic themes described above, the following feedback was received that is particular to this public toilet:

- Closures will have an impact on community groups, such as bikers
- The facilities are in need of an upgrade, rather than closure

Question Two: Would the closure of this toilet be detrimental to your quality of life, and ability to participate in local events/ activities?

377 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 327 (86.74%)

No: 50 (13.26%)

284 comments were received that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on their quality of life and ability to participate in local events and activities. A summary of the themes covered by these responses and examples of comments received are detailed as <u>Appendix Six</u> of this report.

Question Three: If you are providing comments on behalf of a group, please provide comments on how these closures would impact on your local area

15 comments were received to this question. A range of themes were covered in the comments provided, including concerns for the tourism industry in the area and the impact on cruise passengers. Examples of these comments are detailed in <u>Appendix</u> <u>Six</u> of this report.

Joppa

Question One: Do you think the closure of this toilet will affect you or others in your local community?

200 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 196 (98%)

No: 4 (2%)

178 comments were received, that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on them or others in their community. The range of themes that were covered in these responses and examples of responses are detailed in <u>Appendix</u> <u>Seven</u> of this report.

In addition to the generic themes described above, the following feedback was received that is particular to this public toilet:

- The toilet is in close proximity to the beach
- The toilet is regularly used by the local community
- Closure of the toilet would have an impact on tourists and holidaymakers

Question Two: Would the closure of this toilet be detrimental to your quality of life, and ability to participate in local events/ activities?

194 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 175 (90.21%)

No: 19 (9.79%)

161 comments were received that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on their quality of life and ability to participate in local events and activities. A summary of the themes covered by these responses and examples of comments received are detailed as <u>Appendix Seven</u> of this report.

Question Three: If you are providing comments on behalf of a group, please provide comments on how these closures would impact on your local area

Eight responses were received to this question. A range of themes were covered within the comments provided, including concerns for public health, anticipated impact on the local economy and a suggestion to decrease the opening hours of this public toilet. A summary of the themes covered by these responses and examples of comments received are detailed as <u>Appendix Seven</u> of this report.

Juniper Green

Question One: Do you think the closure of this toilet will affect you or others in your local community?

54 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 51 (94.44%)

No: 3 (5.56%)

44 comments were received that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on them or others in their community, including an impact of people walking along the Water of Leith. The range of themes that were covered in these responses and examples of responses are detailed in <u>Appendix Eight</u> of this report.

Question Two: Would the closure of this toilet be detrimental to your quality of life, and ability to participate in local events/ activities?

54 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 47 (87.04%)

No: 7 (12.96%)

40 comments were received that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on their quality of life and ability to participate in local events and activities. A summary of the themes covered by these responses and examples of comments received are detailed as <u>Appendix Eight</u> of this report.

Question Three: If you are providing comments on behalf of a group, please provide comments on how these closures would impact on your local area

Two responses were received to this question, which mention the lack of alternative toilets in the area. These responses are included in <u>Appendix Eight</u> of this report.

London Road

Question One: Do you think the closure of this toilet will affect you or others in your local community?

198 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 187 (94.44%)

No: 11 (5.56%)

170 comments were received, that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on them or others in their community. The range of themes that were covered in these responses and examples of responses are detailed in <u>Appendix Nine</u> of this report.

In addition to the generic themes described above, the following feedback was received that is particular to this public toilet:

- The public toilet is in close proximity to Easter Road Stadium and closure will have an impact on match days and during sporting events
- The toilet is in close proximity to a bus stop
- The current toilet is a clean and convenient facility
- Closure would cause an increase in antisocial behaviour

Question Two: Would the closure of this toilet be detrimental to your quality of life, and ability to participate in local events/ activities?

191 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 149 (78.01%)

No: 42 (21.99%)

131 comments were received, that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on their quality of life and ability to participate in local events and activities. A summary of the themes covered by these responses and examples of comments received are detailed as <u>Appendix Nine</u> of this report.

In addition to the generic themes described above, the following feedback was received that is particular to this public toilet:

- Football fans use these facilities on match days
- Closure of toilets would reduce antisocial behaviour

Question Three: If you are providing comments on behalf of a group, please provide comments on how these closures would impact on your local area.

Five responses were received to this question, and comments on a range of themes were provided. These are summarised as follows:

- Impact on walkers
- Impact on local people
- Impact on the gay community
- Impact on Tourists

Examples of the comments received to this question are included as <u>Appendix Nine</u> of this report.

Middle Meadow Walk

Question One: Do you think the closure of this toilet will affect you or others in your local community?

377 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 370 (98.14%)

No: 7 (1.86%)

339 comments were received, that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on them or others in their community. The range of themes that were covered in these responses and examples of responses are detailed in <u>Appendix Ten</u> of this report.

In addition to the generic themes described above, the following feedback was received that is particular to this public toilet:

- This toilet is located in the very busy/popular area of the Meadows
- Closure of toilets would prevent visits to the Meadows
- More public toilets are needed
- Closure would have a negative impact on social activities
- Suggestion for alternative types of toilets
- Refurbishment of these toilets was to be part of the nearby Quartermile development
- Happy for this toilet to be closed as alternatives are nearby

Question Two: Would the closure of this toilet be detrimental to your quality of life, and ability to participate in local events/ activities?

371 responses were received to this question

Yes: 342 (92.18%)

No: 29 (7.82%)

295 comments were received, that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on their quality of life and ability to participate in local events and activities. In addition to the generic themes described above, it was felt that the impact of closures will be worse during the Festival, that refurbishment of these toilets was to be part of the nearby Quartermile development, and that there should be more toilets available.

A summary of the themes covered by these responses and examples of comments received are detailed as <u>Appendix Ten</u> of this report.

Question Three: If you are providing comments on behalf of a group, please provide comments on how these closures would impact on your local area

11 responses were received to this question. In addition to the generic themes described above, it was felt that the council has spent money elsewhere that could have been better used to retain these toilet facilities. A summary of these comments is included as <u>Appendix Ten</u> of this report.

St. John's Road

Question One: Do you think the closure of this toilet will affect you or others in your local community?

138 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 135 (97.83%)

No: 3 (2.17%)

114 comments were received, that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on them or others in their community. The range of themes that were covered in these responses and examples of responses are detailed in <u>Appendix</u> <u>Eleven</u> of this report.

In addition to the generic themes described above, the following feedback was received that is particular to this public toilet:

- The toilet is close to a bus stop and is in a very busy area
- Willing to pay a charge for use of public toilets
- Agreement with idea of Community Toilet Scheme
- Decrease in antisocial behaviour
- Closure would have no impact

Question Two: Would the closure of this toilet be detrimental to your quality of life, and ability to participate in local events/ activities?

138 responses were received to this question.

- Yes: 110 (70.71%)
- No: 28 (20.29%)

85 comments were received, that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on their quality of life and ability to participate in local events and activities. A summary of the themes covered by these responses and examples of comments received are detailed as <u>Appendix Eleven</u> of this report. In addition to the generic themes described above, there was concern expressed about how the visual amenity of the area would be following the closure of this toilet.

Question Three: If you are providing comments on behalf of a group, please provide comments on how these closures would impact on your local area

Six responses were received to this question, which commented on the lack of alternative facilities, the impact closures would have on events such as Corstorphine Fair, and the reduction in visitors to the local area if the closure of this toilet is to go ahead. These comments can be viewed in <u>Appendix Eleven</u> of this document.

Tollcross

Question One: Do you think the closure of this toilet will affect you or others in your local community?

120 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 117 (97.5%)

No: 3 (2.5%)

101 comments were received, that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on them or others in their community. The range of themes that were covered in these responses and examples of responses are detailed in <u>Appendix</u> <u>Twelve</u> of this report.

In addition to the generic themes described above, the following feedback was received that is particular to this public toilet:

- Toilet is located near to a bus stop, in a very busy area
- Closures would have an impact on tourists
- Additional toilets are required
- Suggest to close this toilet and improve those nearby
- Willing to pay a charge for use of public toilets
- Closure would cause a decrease in antisocial behaviour

Question Two: Would the closure of this toilet be detrimental to your quality of life, and ability to participate in local events/ activities?

120 responses were received to this question.

Yes: 110 (91.67%)

No: 10 (8.33%)

97 comments were received, that described the impact respondents felt this closure would have on their quality of life and ability to participate in local events and activities. A summary of the themes covered by these responses and examples of comments received are detailed as <u>Appendix Twelve</u> of this report.

In addition to the generic themes described above, the following feedback was received that is particular to this public toilet:

- Toilet is in close proximity to a bus stop
- Suggestion that local businesses open up their toilets

Question Three: If you are providing comments on behalf of a group, please provide comments on how these closures would impact on your local area

Three responses were received to this question, which commented on the valuable service that public toilets provide, the antisocial behaviour already impacting businesses in the local area, and the anticipation of an increase in public urination if the toilets were to close. These comments can be viewed in <u>Appendix Twelve</u> of this document.

Additional Comments

Responses were also received via telephone, email and in one case, via letter. In addition to the comments included about specific public toilets that have already been described, the following points were made:

- That staff salaries and numbers across the Council should be reviewed
- That revenue could be generated from advertising within public toilets
- That money has been spent elsewhere by the Council that would have been better spent on public toilets
- That public toilets are frequently used by frontline staff.

Community Management

In order to explore potential alternative means of maintaining public toilets, community groups that may be interested in finding out more about taking on a degree of management of their local public toilet were invited to provide their contact details.

82 names of individuals and 21 community groups provided their contact details in response to this question.

Community Toilet Scheme

In order to explore potential alternative means of maintaining public toilets, expressions of interest were invited from businesses that may be interested in finding out more about participating in a Community Toilet Scheme.

Eight responses were received to this question. These businesses are in various locations across the city and will be provided with relevant information about the scheme by the end of June 2015.

Canaan Lane: Themes of Responses Received to Question One

Theme	Sample Comments
Closures will have an impact on specific user groups, such as drivers, older people and parents with young children	My comments relate to all public toilets. Having previously worked as a nurse then care worker in the community, I know that certain members of society would be adversely affected by lack of access to public toilets. For example those who may need to go more often like, pregnant ladies, men with prostate problems, anyone following surgery for gynaecological or bowel problems. People with dementia are often not able to hold on for long. Lack of toilet facilities would greatly affect their ability to be out and about. Having to pop in to cafes to use the toilet every time would be expensive
There are no other toilets in the local area	When I am shopping in Morningside, which I do often, both to "get out" and to do shopping in the local stores which I like to support. I am a regular user of the Canaan Lane toilet. Here I know I can rush in have a pee without having to wait. I know there is a toilet in the Library, but it is for solo use, with a lockable door. If I get there and find it occupied I can have problems. It is not a viable alternative for someone like me.
Closure will have an impact on those with certain medical conditions	I have a bladder problem and need to know that public toilets are available. If not, then I don't do shopping or go to events in the area. Also a problem when out with children. Closure would mean too fouling of the streets and gardens.
Public toilets are an essential public service	It would deny the constituents, who pay a fortune for provision of these services in the form of Council Tax, of a vital public service. Many, many people from all walks of life from the elderly and medically compromised to the professional driver rely on these services daily.
Closure will have an impact on businesses	The Canaan Lane public toilets are our only option for facilities for our staff. Aside from my personal interests the toilet is well kept and in high frequency use; a great facility for the local community. I am asked, on a nearly daily basis, for directions to the convenience. We use the toilet a number of times each day ourselves and, more often than not, other people are also utilising it at all times of day. This toilet is clearly needed and used by the local people. The idea of closing such a high use facility that is the closest accessible option to two critical care facilities, in the nearby hospitals, seems fundamentally wrong. Vulnerable people from either hospital, the large number of parents with young children and the predominantly older local residents need this facility. The community and local businesses alike are using the facility every single day.

Closure would have a negative impact on the well- being of residents	Morningside is a busy high street with many visitors many of whom are elderly and might need frequent and urgent recourse to a toilet. We believe that the Canaan Lane toilets, which are in exemplary condition, are an important civic amenity the closure of which would have a detrimental impact on residents and visitors. Not everyone wants (or can afford) to patronise a coffee stop in order to use a toilet. The other alternative, the Library, has much more restricted opening times than the public toilets - we also question whether a stream of visitors to use the toilet is an appropriate use of a library. The Canaan Lane toilets are frequently used by homeless people and, perhaps more significantly, the local population of street-drinkers drawn by the nearby Addiction Unit at the Royal Edinburgh Hospital. We feel that such users would not be welcome in the Library or in local coffee shops. Consequently, we believe that closure of the public toilets would lead directly to an increased incidence of people relieving themselves in public places and private stairs and gardens.
Closure will have an impact on local businesses and tourists	Would affect the ill, the elderly, and women most. Area losing toilets would lose business. Recently in London to go to theatre and ended up walking some distance and having to go to a restaurant to use a toilet because of a lack of public toilets. Have not been back and will not go back. Suggest to close this toilet and improve those nearby	These toilets are in a poor state of repair and are unpleasant to use. If the Meadows toilets were improved I would suggest these were closed. Perhaps a superloo could replace them?
Willing to pay charge for use of public toilets	Although this toilet looks a bit rough and ready it is a necessity for those who need the loo more frequently than others. We cannot all keep buying coffees at cafes to use loos. I would be prepared to pay 30p a time for Edinburgh loos. Better that small charge than removing access to loos.
Decrease in antisocial behaviour	None at all, it is a filthy toilet that is clearly only used by certain members of the public for 'other ' activities including drug use etc.
